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FOOTPATH REPAIRED

This is the footpath from King Edwards Avenue to the George Lane/Spring Lane path. It was covered with weeds and broken tarmac.

With help from our MP Dr. Dan Poulter and Cllr. Carol Poulter (East Suffolk Council) together with

the Flagship Homes legal team and ourselves, Wickham Market Parish Council, it was established that Flagship were responsible for the King



Edwards Avenue footpath. They immediately planned and completed resurfacing and widening of the footpath to the benefit of all residents including wheelchair users.

Many thanks to all involved for a successful outcome.

VILLAGE HALL CAR PARK REPAIRS

We all know just how bad the corner of the Village Hall Car Park can get, particularly in the winter. It has been steadily getting worse.



As a temporary solution, The Parish Council have agreed to repair the car park sur-

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face and share the cost with the Village Hall Management. While the surface has been repaired so that it is safe for vehicles and pedestrians, the drainage is still an issue. The old soak-away is ineffective, so there is nowhere for excess storm water to go. A gravel drain will reduce some of the excess water, reducing the strain on the soak-away in the short term.

A more permanent solution is being investigated in association with ways of improving the car parking facilities available.

CHILDREN'S PLAY PARK UPDATE

All equipment and seating has been professionally jet washed. This is the first part of a

long overdue maintenance and upgrade programme for the Children's Play area at the Village Hall.

The next stage is to carry out maintenance and repairs on some of the equipment to ensure that it all remains safe. Quotes for this are currently being reviewed.

Once this is completed, the plan is to lay bonded shredded rubber surfacing around each piece of equipment to provide low maintenance all weather surfacing. There will still be plenty of grass in-between to play on.

ACTION ON SPEEDING!

Wickham Market Parish Council has taken advantage of a supplier's special offer and purchased four solar powered Vehicle Activated Speed Indicator Devices.



These will require minimal maintenance and will record speed in both directions. Two are currently being installed on the High Street near Morris Road and Fir Tree Close. Two more will be installed on Broad Road and Border Cot Lane once posts have been installed.

Our existing device, which has been deployed near Morris Road, will then be moved around to monitor other areas. The device facing north on the Deben bridge is also being looked at as it has not worked reliably for some time.

While these signs have a traffic calming effect, they may not deter determined speeders.

SIZEWELL C

EDF's plans for building Sizewell C were given approval in July 2022 by the then Secretary of State for Business, Kwasi Kwarteng, following an examination of EDF's application by the Planning Inspectorate in 2021. In their recommendation to the Secretary of State, the Planning Inspectorate suggested that the plans be rejected until the availability of fresh water supplies had been resolved and certain environmental issues addressed. The Secretary of State chose to grant approval, and a judicial review of his decision by concerned groups was overturned in the High Court in October of last year.

EDF is preparing for the project, which will include two new nuclear reactors capable of generating 3.2 gigawatts – enough electricity, claim EDF, to pow-

er 6 million homes for 60 years. Initial preparations are already under way in and around the Sizewell C site. These are largely archaeological, ground investigation and environmental works.

But there remains uncertainty about how Sizewell C will be funded. The project was originally expected to cost £20 billion, but is likely to be considerably higher than this. It is hoped that private sector investors will put their money into the project, but this is by no means certain and it is unlikely that EDF will make a final investment decision until 2024.

Sizewell traffic issues and the impact of the Southern Park and Ride on Wickham Market and the surrounding villages remains a key concern and discussions continue with EDF on how these impacts can be minimised if the project goes ahead.

GLIMATE GHANGE



Wickham Market has seen a busy few months in relation to our progress on how our Parish will join the global fight against Climate Change.

We have just had COP27 in late 2022, hosted in Egypt. This means there has been 27 years of world leaders working on the issue that still remains hugely problematic.

There is much literature out there to soak up on varying issues and unfortunately there is only so much that individuals can do, as we appreciate that systemic change is needed for the majority of progress to be made. This however, does not negate our need as individuals to try and make reasonable change, as if we all work together, we can make more of a drop in the ocean and maybe even cause a wave.

We started off with our Parish Council declaring a Climate Change Emergency, in line with Suffolk County Council and Central Government. We then formed a working group (to which we are still welcoming members), to work on a clear route for our Parish Council. We met for our first meeting on 7th

November and it was fabulous, well attended and full of passion.

We have worked together with Rendlesham Parish Council who have done an absolutely amazing job over the last few years and are very focussed on their plans. We have adapted the Climate Action Strategy (CAS) that Rendlesham had made, specific to Wickham Market, and this was adopted at the full council meeting on 21st November (this is published on Parish Council website under documents).

We launched our CAS at the Wickham Market Christmas Market, enjoying help from our School Children, with a Christmas tree they decorated. We were all able to add our climate change worries and solutions as Christmas decorations. We really feel engaging our youth into climate strategy is important. The school will also run a competition for the children to design the front cover of our CAS during school hours over the coming weeks.

Thank you to all of you who have helped thus far and we cannot wait to start doing all we can to learn and help the Climate Change, for the better.

PROVIDING ACTIVITIES FOR LOCAL YOUNG PRODUE

Having listened to the concerns of local young people, a Young Adults Group has been launched in Wickham Market.

Following a successful application to the Framlingham, Wickham Market and Villages Community Partnership's Small Grant Scheme, Wickham Market Parish Council and Leiston-based Young People Taking Action (The CYDS Project) have been awarded £4,000 to support the launch of the group.

The group provides a safe meeting point for local young people, enabling them to meet their friends and take part in sports, arts, multimedia activities and learn life skills. Education and support will also be available, ensuring young people are aware of the activities and opportunities which are available to them.

Since the start of the Young Adults group in June 2022 the venue has been full almost every week in the Village Hall committee room. To ensure this valuable provision is accessed by all that need it, the provision is being moved to a larger venue and the hours extended. It is planned that two youth groups will be based at the primary school, one for younger teenagers and one for the older teenagers. The groups will be run by qualified professional youth workers from the CYDS project.

The new venue would enable more young people to attend with better facilities for activities and improved space for confidential conversations. The aims of these groups are to support young people's mental health and increase opportunities to seek support should it be needed, increase the health and well being of those attending, improve young people's engagement and confidence.

The Young Adults group moved to the school on the 11th January when 18 attended. The younger group will be invited to attend on a date to be announced.

Cllr Carol Poulter, Chair of the Framlingham, Wickham Market and Villages Community Partnership, said: "As well as providing a safe meeting place, the new service will help us better understand what our young people want and need, allowing us to provide more activities and services for them in future. Providing more opportunities for local young people is one of the Community Partnership's priorities, along with reducing social isolation and loneliness which can affect people of all ages. The Parish Council have listened to our local young people, and we are delighted to be able to support them and the CYDS Project in the creation of this new club."

QUIET LANES SUFFOLK

In February 2021 Quiet Lanes Suffolk started the formal 'Proposal to Designate' process with Wave One, overall there will be four Waves.

Wickham Market has three lanes designated: Wave 3. Spring Lane and Mill Lane Wave 4 Chapel Lane

These were recommended for designation and formally signed off by Suffolk County Council's Cabinet Minister and published in the EADT, at this stage the Lanes became 'legal' and the signs could be installed. Posts



are being installed and the signs along with the fixings will be ready to collect and install once the weather improves.

Quiet Lanes is not about speed restrictions, it is to indicate to drivers of vehicles to be aware of other road users on the lane such as walkers, dog walkers, cyclists and horses. Let us all enjoy our Quiet Lanes. www.quietlanessuffolk.co.uk

PARISH BOUNDARY CHANGE FOR WICKHAM MARKET

In December 2021, following agreement with Pettistree Parish Council, Wickham Market Parish Council started a petition to move the southern boundary to include the Wickham Gate development.

The main reasons for the change include

- The development is next to Wickham Market
- Pettistree does not have the amenities to serve a development of this size in shops and services
- Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) payable to East Suffolk Council who then distribute a portion to the Parish to fund community projects
- 136 new homes contributing to Wickham Market through their council tax every year
- There is more financial benefit to Wickham Market in a boundary change than there would have been for Pettistree

However, with the Community Governance Review 2021 - 2022, Terms of Reference signatures were no longer required but the request for a boundary change was approved and will be put in place from 1 April 2023.

Here we highlight a local community project in each issue of Wickham Market Parish News. In this first issue we talk to Anna who has been working really hard since moving here to bring the community together.



Hi Anna, thanks for giving Wickham Market some more of your valuable time to tell us about The Giving Community Wickham Market. We would love to hear about The Giving Community that you and a group of wonderful volunteers have started. What was the need that you saw for you to start the project?

We started The Giving Community Wickham Market in 2021 as a response to tackling isolation, poor well-being and increasing connection again locating post Covid 19.



Where would you like to see The Giving Community in another 6 months time?

Our vision is to see a community that is connected in many different ways, all inclusive, with different generations learning from each other. A safe place where people feel safe, feel connected and learn how to improve their well-being.

How would you describe the importance of our wonderful volunteers in the community to help projects such as the allotment and your Wellbeing cafe?

We have been running The Wellbeing Cafe for a year now and have developed a great group of volunteers and local people that come along weekly. Volunteers are at the basis of community.

We've been to a few of your Wellbeing cafés and we loved it, how would you describe these sessions?

The Wellbeing tree cafe runs each week on a Wednesday morning 10.30 - 12.30 where we welcome people of all ages and backgrounds to join us for a drink and piece of cake. Each week we run a different activity such as - Quiz Relaxation and well-being activities Singing Art and craft/games Day trips We also aim to hold a community fun day during each of the school holidays where we run activities for children and their families too, these have been very popular. People have said that they feel like they are part of one big family, and that they enjoy meeting new people and taking part in activities.

Could you please tell us how the community allotment works, its benefits and what the aim of the allotment is?

Wickham Market Parish Council kindly agreed to let us utilise a plot on the Glebe allotments, to use as a community project in July 2022. The plot was very overgrown and had a lot of rubbish to clear but, we quickly got a group together and started to clear the land ready to start planting in Spring 23.

We aim to build a community of people who come together to garden, and form friendships. A place where people feel safe, learn about growing fruit and vegetables while improving their wellbeing at the same time!

There are many benefits of allotment gardening here's some for you:

- · Good for your mental health and wellbeing
- Social gathering gives people the opportunity to form new connections, reducing isolation or loneliness
- · Good for the environment, we will use organic growing methods
- We will plant plants that encourage wildlife and insects like bees
- Save money by cooking with home-grown food from the allotment
- Provides a good sense of achievement building confidence
- Fresh air, being outside and in nature
- Good exercise

To become a member of our community allotment we ask that you commit to being actively involved in the group. Membership - £5 for one person annually, £10 for a family with two adults and any number of children annually. The money will go straight back into the allotment so we are able to buy allotment related essentials. Membership benefits include:

- 1. Access to the shed padlock code
- 2. Be a part of our team (and WhatsApp group)
- 3. Have a share of the produce
- 4. Come along to fun events such as BBQ, educational events

We are really thankful you have allowed us some insight into what keeps you busy, we understand that gardening has so many benefits and growing your own veg is so rewarding, thank you for starting the projects off and we wish you all the success in Wickham Market.

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Voter ID: A summary

On **Thursday 4 May 2023**, local elections are taking place across 230 councils in England.

At these elections, you will need to bring photo ID to be able to vote at a polling station. A wide range of photo ID will be accepted, including passports, driving licences and cards with a PASS Mark.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate.
