SPOTUGHT On Ray Lewis

Hello to you Ray, thank you for allowing us to shine our spotlight on you for this edition of the Parish News.

Please could you introduce yourself to us, and tell us a little bit about yourself and your history in Wickham Market?



My life in Wickham began in 1980 when I was offered promotion and a career move to BT Adastral Park. I had previously worked in the cities of Liverpool and Manchester so coming to sleepy Suffolk was a bit of a shock at first for a city boy like me. Looking for somewhere to live was the number one priority for me and my wife and young family. We needed to find somewhere not too far away from Martlesham, so I was able to get to work easily. I remember us getting a map out and drawing a 10-mile radius circle around Martlesham and we started house hunting for anything within that circle. We didn't search for long and were very fortunate to find Lynn House on the market. It was well out of our price range, and maxed out our mortgage, but we fell in love with it and just had to have it. At the time, it felt that Lynn House and Wickham wanted us to live here.

Lynn House needed so much work doing to it, and I recall going to work each day and coming home in the evenings and having to start work on the house. Weekends were similarly taken up with restoration work. This went on for several years, but we worked our way through all the jobs and still managed to find time to make new friends and get involved in Wickham life.

We are always seeing you around the village and involved in a range of activities, helping where you can. Can you tell us a little about your projects and why you volunteer so much of your time?

I have long held an interest in church bell ringing but never had an opportunity to have a go, and soon after moving to Wickham I was chatting to a couple of bellringers, Ernie Steward and Ted Tindale-Biscoe, who were trying to recruit new ringers for the soon to be restored bells at All Saints. The bells had been out of action for several years and they no longer had a band to ring them. So along with a few others, I volunteered to learn to ring and was trained at Easton church. After 6 months, we were sufficiently competent to be allowed to ring for the dedication service of the newly rehung bells on All Saints Day, 1980. This was a major milestone for me and the start of a long love affair with bellringing. As Tower Captain, I really enjoy teaching others to ring church bells. So, if you know of someone who is interested, then please contact me.

My other passions are sailing and the RNLI. When we moved to Wickham, I brought with me, my 14-foot dinghy and began sailing it on the local rivers with my family. I swapped my dinghy for a small yacht a few years ago which I now keep on a mooring on the river at Woodbridge and sail it whenever I can.

My passion for the RNLI started in Llandudno where my uncle was Coxswain of the lifeboat there. As a young boy, I loved the sea and boats, and he used to take me round the lifeboat and the boathouse. I can remember witnessing the lifeboat being launched from the beach on a rescue mission and see it return later with lives it has saved. It wasn't until we moved to Wickham, and I resumed sailing, that it rekindled my interest in the RNLI, and I joined the committee of RNLI Woodbridge Branch of which I am now Secretary. I have now been a member of the Branch for over 35 years and have recently been honoured to receive a gold award and a long service medal from the RNLI.

Closer to home, I have been involved in preparing the Neighbourhood Plan and have been on the committee since its inception in 2015. After the successful referendum result, the plan has now been 'made' and is to be used by ESC when making decisions on planning applications in the area.

I am also one of six trustees of the Wickham Market Partnership which is a charity that was set up in 2002 to improve Wickham Market and surrounding areas. It has enabled and supported many local projects and initiatives since it was formed most notably the setting up of the Library and Resource Centre, a web hosting service, the Men's Shed, the Wickham Market Round Robin, and moving the Archive Centre to a new location in the garden of the Resource Centre. I have been a regular volunteer at the library for over 10 years now where I offer free IT support, problem solving and advice.

Last but not least. I have an allotment on the Glebe and spend as much time as I can tending my plot. Along with the joy of growing your own food and flowers, it's a great way to stay fit and healthy and to socialise with fellow plotholders. My wife would say that I spend more time yacking than I do gardening! And she's probably right! I am on the Allotment Association committee as secretary. If you know of anyone looking for an allotment, then please contact me.

How would you describe Wickham Market and what it means to you, and the volunteers that we cherish here?

We have now lived in Wickham for 44 years, and we have genuinely loved every one of those years and been very happy here. My two girls have grown up here, went to primary school here, and later caught the bus to Thomas Mills. And now my grandchildren are following the same path. There is so much going on for people to do and get involved with. It is a shame that more people don't come forward to get involved and volunteer. They are missing out.

Lastly, we'd love you to share anything else we should know and an inspirational quote that you like to fall back on....

For me, I am a great believer in the power of positive thinking and Norman Vincent Peale's quote says it all. "The way to happiness: Keep your heart free from hate, your mind from worry. Live simply, expect little, give much. Fill your life with love. Scatter sunshine. Forget self, think of others. Do as you would be done by."

PARISH ENVIRONMENT GROUP AND THE GREEN GYM

Our informal group of volunteers have been busy working around the village with planting projects, young tree care, and planting the 500 daffodil bulbs supplied by East Suffolk Council.

Over the next two months we will continue adding trees to the new community wood in Pettistree: The Java Lodge Spinney. The spinney at the end of the Green Lane track off Chapel Lane is continuing to receive our care and more trees will be added very soon.



Some of the trees planted are now well established, one day they will be landscape features, providing havens and corridors for birds and wildlife, adding to local biodiversity and enhancing the environment and local climate of the Parishes.



On Sunday 7th January working at the Simons Cross sports field, I was reminded how many years young trees need our attention. After 25 years the trees still need our care, maintaining, removing plastic, pruning, and adding more trees. A verdant line of oak, ash, chestnut, cherry, plum, spindle, hawthorn, blackthorn, holly, hazel, pop-

lar, and field maple are making a shelter belt for the football and tennis players and a fabulous habitat and corridor for birds and bees.

Sadly, our green spaces attract litter! A determined volunteer filled three large bags of litter on Sunday from the field and around the trees and seats. What a shame people don't use the bins provided or take their rubbish home!

Most work parties are held at the weekend (Saturdays and Sunday mornings), but some are held on weekdays. We aim to enjoy the time outside and help the environment in good company. All ages welcome!

In addition, two-hour work parties are held in the Parish Cemetery on the last Thursday of each month at 10am. Tasks includes tidy ups, tree TLC and mulching, hedge, wild flower management and adding bulbs.



Look out for the early spring drifts of snowdrops planted over the last 25 years



The drifts of daffodils (Narcissi Carlton) should be seen flowering in Spring at the Cemetery, the Pightle Green and at the end of Broad Way.

Many of you took away our hedgehog hole sur-


rounds that we gave out, in order to help our wildlife move from garden to garden without having to risk the roads and people.

We were very pleased with the number of families who responded favourably, and over 20 of the surrounds have found homes with local people who have made gaps in fencing or gates or dug a 13cm trench under their boundaries to enable wildlife to pass.

Remember to keep leaving clean water out for wildlife, as if a hedgehog does hibernate then wake up, they need to hydrate and find food urgently. Puddles are often frozen at night or have traces of poison such as antifreeze in, which can kill all wildlife.

REMEMBERING WICKHAM MARKET'S PAST

In this, the third of three articles, Philip Tallent, of the Archive Centre explains more about a serviceman from Wickham Market who died in the Second World War and is buried in a Commonwealth War Grave in the village cemetery.

STANLEY GEORGE HALL.

Stanley was born on 21 Jun 1920 at Saxtead, the son of Edith Emily Hall.

He enlisted in the Royal Australian Air Force (RAAF) on 9 September 1940, with Service number 411775. (I have not been able to find out why Stanley joined the Australian Air Force, so any information that anyone may have, would be extremely useful).



He was stationed at RAF Balderton, in Nottinghamshire, from August to November 1943 with 1668 Heavy Conversion Unit, before being posted to 617 (Dambusters) Squadron at RAF Woodhall Spa in Lincolnshire, where he served as a Wireless Operator. (He arrived after the famous Dambusters raid in May 1943.



This photo was taken at RAF Station Bottesford, Leicester. It shows the crew of a Lancaster bomber of no. 467 squadron RAAF. the second RAAF Lancaster squadron to be formed in the UK. Flight Sergeant (later Flying Officer) Stanley George Hall, is on the left of the picture.

On 12 February 1944, a Lancaster bomber took off to carry out an attack on the Antheor Viaduct in Southern France. Having completed its mission, the aircraft was returning to base after refuelling at RAF Station Ford, West Sussex, when it crashed 10 miles north east of Chichester at 0830 hours. Seven on board were killed and the Squadron Leader was injured, but later died of his injuries.



Flying Officer Stanley George Hall, the Wireless Air Gunner, was a member of the crew, who died on 13th February 1944 at the age of 23.

Flying Officer Hall's name is listed on War Memorials in Sussex and Canberra, Australia, as well as our own, in Chapel Lane.

His grave is in Wickham Market cemetery and is the easiest of the three Commonwealth War Graves to find – it is on the left of the main drive.

His mother lived at 3 Sandy Lane, Wickham Market.

CLIMATE CHANGE GROUPS SPRING TIPS




RIVER DEBEN WATER QUALITY UPDATE

Regular water sampling and testing, at least once a month, for E.coli and for phosphates in the non-tidal River Deben has continued through the winter months at key locations including Debenham, Easton, Wickham Market, Rendlesham and Ufford.

The very high pollution levels following Storm Babet have fallen away although the Wickham Market sewage treatment works continues to discharge "treated water" with very high levels of E.coli - more than 30,000 colonies per 100ml (compared to the healthy bathing limit of 900 colonies per 100ml). The phosphate levels at most locations are also well over the accepted limits.

At a meeting with Anglian Water in late November we heard about their plans for phosphate removal investment in 5 sewage treatment plants - Debenham will be an early location with others following into 2025 and beyond. Although welcome, this is still too long to wait for our river to be cleaned up. There seem to be no plans to improve water treatment for E.coli and related bacteria.

A pop-up exhibition on 'Water and our River' at the Deben Climate Centre in Woodbridge went live on 26th November and ran until Christmas. This featured information boards about the state of the River Deben and about water abstraction in the non-tidal section from Wilford Bridge up to Brandeston. An evening meeting of the water quality volunteers was held on 18th December and was joined by Dr Nick Tucker from the University of Suffolk; he shared the latest insights from their studies of E.coli related toxins found in the Deben.



Several new volunteers have joined the sampling activities but more are welcome especially to support Gemma Dempsey-Gray's water testing hub in the Wickham Market area.
